STEP ONE:

We admitted we were powerless over alcohol — that our lives had become unmanageable.

Step One asks us to be truthful about whom we are – people from all walks of life who share a common illness, the disease of alcoholism. When we drink, we are powerless over the consequences of our illness and our lives fall into chaos. Step One is the start of recovering our lives from the insanity of a power greater than ourselves; "King Alcohol," as it is called in the "Big Book."

There is but one *must* to this simple program of recovery: we *must* be entirely honest about the truth of who we are and the truth of our disease if we are to recover from it. Sadly, there are those "unfortunates" who do not recover, usually men and women who seem to have been born "constitutionally incapable" of being "honest with themselves."

Looking back on my journey through recovery, I did not get this the first time. I failed to be rigorously honest with myself. I still had the belief that somehow, someday I could drink again; that I could "beat the game." I was "incredibly dishonest and selfish" in respect to this fundamental truth: I am an alcoholic.

Not only was I not truthful with myself about this simple fact, I was blind to the terrible damage I wrought around me because I would not be rigorous about this fact. I was like a "tornado roaring his way through the lives of others." I was thoughtless. I was selfish and self-centered. Such are the defects from which spring all my troubles.

What happened is this: I let go of this program of recovery and I relapsed. I disconnected from the fellowship, the God of my understanding, and myself, and then I abandoned myself to drink.

For those of us who are alcoholics the choice is stark and simple: either we get who we are or we shall be doomed to failure. Either we acknowledge the truth before us that we are powerless over alcohol and our lives are a mess because of drinking, or we will inevitably end up institutionalized, in jail or in the ground. The choice is ours to make.

In his great poem, <u>The Road Less Traveled</u>, Robert Frost speaks of choosing between two roads.

We alcoholics also face two roads: the road of recovery and the road of alcoholism – one is a life of rigorous honesty, while the other is a life of lies and deceit. Day after day, I must make the decision which road I wish to travel. Today, I choose the road of Recovery. Today, I choose not to drink. Today, I acknowledge the truth of who I am: my name is Bill S. and I am an alcoholic - and that has made all the difference.

When A.A. was very young, the first members clearly saw the preservation of its unity as a life-or-death matter for themselves and for the alcoholics still unrecovered. The First Tradition states this aim, and it is the common aim of all Twelve Traditions. . . .

Those early members quickly recognized power-drivers as potential group-wreckers. And they're still around—the members who are always sure that they're always right—the members who are happily ready to assume all the burdens of leadership and grimly unwilling to share them, let alone give them up. But a group does need officers. How can we cope with this dilemma? Tradition Two provides the answer. ...

Editorial: Singleness of Purpose

For the survival of our AA program, it seems time for all of our groups to take a good look at what is going on regarding individuals who attend our meetings but do not identify themselves as alcoholics.

There was a meeting that came to our attention a short time ago where thirteen people were in attendance; eight of them introduced themselves as alcoholics and the other five called themselves "addicts."

If they were truly alcoholics at an A.A. meeting why did they introduce themselves as addicts? The squad leader was one of the addicts and started the Step meeting with a discussion of the First Step, which says "We admitted that we were powerless over alcohol and our lives have become unmanageable." It does not say we were powerless over cocaine, heroin, weed, etc. It would seem that this meeting was in direct violation of our Third Tradition which say anonymity is paramount. Here we apparently have five non-alcoholics in attendance at a closed meeting, one of which is squad leader.

Reports are becoming more frequent that incidents like this are becoming commonplace and are threatening our existence by deviating from our clearly stated Tradition Five singleness of purpose.

One of the first things Bill W. and cofounders started out with was that our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety. Bill also said, "We can't be all things to all people".

The following is taken directly from the pamphlet "Problems other than alcohol" by Bill W.

Sobriety - freedom from alcohol - through the teaching and practice of the Twelve Steps is the sole purpose of the A.A. group. Groups have repeatedly tried other activities, and they have always failed. It has also been learned that there is no way to make non-alcoholics into A.A. members. We have to confine our membership to alcoholics, and we have to confine our A.A. groups to a single purpose. If we don't stick to these principles, we shall almost surely collapse. And if we collapse, we cannot help anyone. This is a short treatise on a problem we have that is getting out of hand. Each group should avail themselves of this pamphlet and put their group conscience to work to help solve this threat to our program.

LET'S SEE IF WE CAN KEEP THIS PROGRAM CLEAN AND SIMPLE TO LAST SO IT CAN BE OF HELP TO OTHERS WHO NEED US.

Over great resistance by trustees and members devoted to the status quo, Bill managed to "sell" the idea of calling an A.A. General Service conference (see Concept II), and eleven years later Bill was able to declare, "The results of the Conference have exceeded our highest expectations." This Concept is rooted in Tradition Two, which states:

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority — a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern."

The principles of Tradition Two are crystal-clear, Bill asserts: "The A.A. groups are to be the final authority; their leaders are to be entrusted with delegated responsibilities only." The outside world cannot imagine an organization run this way, but Bill calls it "a spiritualized society characterized by enough enlightenment, enough responsibility, and enough love of man and of God to insure that our democracy of world service will work..."
