#### **TRADITION THREE:** The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking.

In the Intergroup office, we have regular opportunities to discuss who gets to be an A.A. member. When we train new volunteers on the phones about once a week, we have to explain the difference between "closed" meetings, which are limited to those people who have a desire to stop drinking, and "open" meetings, those open to anyone, including family, friends, people with other addictive problems, or students assigned to attend a meeting for a class.

We try to be helpful to every caller, whether they do or don't have a "desire to stop drinking," just as our Responsibility Statement talks about "anyone, anywhere" reaching out for help, and the hand of A.A. being there. If the caller doesn't have a clear desire to stop drinking alcohol, we send them to open speaker meetings or beginner meetings. If callers and visitors are looking for something other than an A.A. meeting, A.A. literature, or a Twelfth Step call (a one-on-one meeting with a sober A.A. member), we explain A.A.'s intentionally narrow focus, and direct them to resources outside of A.A. Of course, we are careful never to endorse any specific organization or institution.

Who gets to go to a "closed" A.A. meeting? Who gets a Twelfth Step call from sober A.A. members? The caller who wishes to stop drinking does. We do not ask the caller to use the word "alcoholic" at this early point in their sobriety career — we don't make any diagnoses. We don't ask the new person to commit to stopping forever. "Just for today" is good enough, at this early stage.

However, sometimes the caller will cause our phone volunteers some confusion by bringing up the topic of "problems other than alcohol" - namely, drugs. Maybe they have been charged with a drug-related offense. Maybe they feel that drugs "brought up the bottom" for them. Well, with over thirty different volunteers answering phones each month, we have to keep things very, very simple. We tell the volunteers that the caller's drug problems matter to us about as much as if they were vegetarian, Sagittarian, Presbyterian or Libertarian: Do you have a desire to stop drinking? If they "qualify" by the Third Tradition, and they mention drugs, we add one extra step: In addition to meeting information and a Twelfth Step call, we give them the number of the other Twelve Step program that can help them with their other issue, the drug problem. We keep in mind that some A.A. groups don't want to hear about drugs in the meeting; other groups seem to believe that if you're an A.A. member, you talk about whatever is on your mind. Intergroup has no power to enforce the Membership Tradition, nor the Primary Purpose Tradition in the groups. Since the groups are each autonomous, they decide together what the ground rules for sharing are in their group.

Some one will read this and wonder, "Why do we bother with all this? Why hasn't A.A. become 'Everything Anonymous' by now? A drug is a drug is a drug, right?" That might be true in some ways, but when it comes to the way the Third Tradition plays out in our Twelve Step work, our Co-founder Bill W. wrote some things that really apply here.

In a 1944 talk to the Medical Society of the State of New York (see the pamphlet, "Three Talks to Medical Societies") Bill explains,

"Now when one alcoholic who has got well talks to another who hasn't . . . the new man sees in a few minutes that he is talking to a kindred spirit, one who understands. Neither can the recovered A.A. member be deceived, for he knows every trick, every rationalization of the drinking game. So the usual barriers go down with a crash. Mutual confidence, that indispensible of all therapy, follows as surely as day does night. And if this absolutely necessary rapport is not forthcoming at once it is almost certain to develop when the new man has met other A.A.'s."

In a 1958 talk, Bill reflected again on his historic visit with Ebby, over Bill's gin at the breakfast table: "The spark that was to become Alcoholics Anonymous had been struck. One alcoholic had been talking to another, making a deep identification with me and bringing the principles of recovery within my reach." Bill used the word *identification*. That's what Bill D., the Big Book's "Anonymous Number Three" meant when he said, "If I had thought they didn't know what they were talking about, I wouldn't have been willing to talk to them at all." Bill D. was willing to talk with Bill W. and Doctor Bob, and to trust them, and to have hope for himself, all because he had heard their stories, and he *identified* with the way they drank. He saw that they had had the same problem as he did.

We can send an alcoholic who got in trouble for cocaine to talk to an alcoholic who is also addicted to pills—they have booze in common; but we can't have a heroin addict with no alcohol problem trying to Twelve Step a wino, or even a chronic, daily marijuana user. We can't send a crack addict to talk to someone who's drinking vodka all day. At this early stage of the process, they will see their differences, rather than their similarities, and that crucial identification will not occur. And that could cost us a life. It could also cost us the future survival of Alcoholics Anonymous.

# <u>STEP THREE</u>: Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God *as we understood Him*.

My reaction to the Steps was that of getting a graduation certificate after finishing the course. That would require some fast work, and study. I set about the "work" of studying and memorizing; and theoretically "doing" the Twelve Steps.

Slamming through the Steps in that first thirty days was eventful and rewarding The Eleventh Step stopped me in my tracks. Attempting to seek through prayer and meditation to improve a conscious contact with God, as We understand him, I was pushed back to Step Three.

The experience was the reward of surrendering to this way of life in totality. My opinion through these years of A.A. is that no one will surrender to this way of life without first agreeing that 1) there is a problem; and 2) that I, alone can not handle it.

Those propositions accepted, leave me the only choice is to go on through life, doing my best each day, to give my decisions and thoughts to that Higher Power/God in charge of all. My only job then, is to act each day as if I am being directed by His Will and not my own. Easy to say, hard to do. Some days I do this very well, and other days not so well – but always to the best of my ability that day.

<u>CONCEPT THREE:</u> As a traditional means of creating and maintaining a clearly defined working relation between the groups, the Conference, the A.A. Just because someone had the title "boss", did not mean that I had to listen to him/her. So coming into A.A. was just another place to not listen. Didn't anyone know with whom they were dealing? There were awards, certificates, etc. on my walls to prove that I was somebody.

Journeying into service work required me to not just hear other people's opinions, but to listen to their side of the proposal. In contrast to my drinking days, it appeared that other people's ideas/opinions were theirs. It soon became apparent that these people were just as fervent in their love for A.A. as I.

It then became necessary to empower those that were trusted servants with trust. Trust that they knew their job, that there had been a selection process that placed them in the position. More than that, I had to let each individual decide what the job actually is. It is important to do their job as they see it, because one has to believe in the guiding hand of Divine Providence in all areas of our fellowship, and therefore, He, who presides over us all – has made the selection process.
