"Were entirely ready to God remove all these defects of character." So read Step Six. After the guilt and remorse of my last drunk had faded, I didn't think this Step had any application in my life. Now that I was no longer drinking I wasn't a bad person. Character defects? I couldn't see where I had any. My character defects were hidden behind all those hurts and injuries I'd saved up through the years and which I regularly brought out and relived with all the original emotions. Not only that, I accumulated any and every new hurt, real or imagined. In fact I took a kind of perverse pleasure from feeling sad and self-pitying. I was giving power to people who where long gone. Then I realized that these people gave me my favorite excuse for why I did what I did or couldn't do what I should have done. I used them to justify my actions and blamed them for my failures. Every time something went wrong in my life or I failed to live up to some responsibility, I took out the list of abuses I'd suffered and used it as an excuse. I became very adapt at hiding my guilt behind these real or imagined hurts. I was a chronic victim.

The problem with blaming my frustrations and failures on what others did to me is that it kept me small. I stayed a little boy trapped in a man's body – a self-centered, selfish little boy who expected people to live up to his fantasies of them and got hurt when they didn't cater to every want and whim.

Although I had made a Third Step decision, I couldn't really turn my life and will over to my Higher Power because it didn't belong to me. Unknowingly, over the years, I'd turned my will over to those people whom I felt injured me in some way.

Fortunately I reached a point where I was choking on all this garbage. With the help of my Higher Power and the AA program, I chose to grow up. It was about time! I opened up that imaginary closet in my mind where I kept these well-nurtured hurts and tossed them into my past, where they belonged. Into this newly cleaned-out space, I started storing my goals and the hopes and dreams of what I wanted to achieve in life. Now instead of looking backwards into the dreariness of my past, I'm looking forward to a bright future because I've finally taken responsibility of my life.

# Tradition 6: An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

The sixth of our Twelve Points of AA Tradition is deemed so important that it states at length the relation of the AA movement to money and property....

Of course, we of AA would be the first to say that many a fine enterprise does a lot of good with their money. To these efforts, money is usually primary; it is their lifeblood. But money is *not* the lifeblood of AA. With us, it is very secondary. Even in small quantities, it is scarcely more than a necessary nuisance, something we wish we could do without entirely. Why is that so?

We explain this easily enough; we don't need money. The core of our AA procedure is one alcoholic talking to another, whether that be sitting on a curbstone, in a home, or at a meeting. It's the message, not the place; it's the talk, not the alms. That does our work. Just places to meet and talk, that's about all AA needs. Beyond these, a few small offices, a few secretaries at their desks, a few dollars apiece a year, easily met by voluntary contributions. Trivial indeed, our expenses!

Nowadays, the AA group answers its well-wishers saying: "Our expenses are trifling. As good earners, we can easily pay them. As we neither need nor want money, why risk its hazards? We'd rather stay poor. Thanks just the same!"

### Notes From your Central Office...

Another of the ways St. Paul Area Intergroup tries to serve is by providing Temporary Sponsors to AA members who do not have one.

Over 190 women and 260 men from AA in our area have volunteered to serve as Temporary Sponsors to those who call Intergroup needing one. And these calls are not infrequent! Over the last 12 months, Intergroup has connected over 340 callers with temporary sponsors from our lists. That's nearly 30 each month!

Most of these calls originate from someone new to recovery, such as those in a treatment program. But since one alcoholic talking with another is so important to recovery in AA, this is a service we are not hesitant to offer to other callers. When a caller tells us they are already in AA but new to our area, or tells us they have been "away" from the Program a while, we ask if they would like us to set them up with a temporary sponsor. And most of the time, they do.

So, thank you to the hundred of local AAs who give us the opportunity to do this. And if you would like to have this opportunity to "work with others", please sign up in our office or on our website to serve as a Temporary Sponsor.
