Step Seven: Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings.

When I first read the chapter on the Seventh Step in the *Twelve and Twelve*, I was not at all sure exactly what humility even was. I had it confused with humiliation. Hey, the words are similar, are they not?! But, oh, what a difference each word's meaning has! Take humiliation. Humiliation means to be embarrassed or ashamed, put simply. Humility, on the other hand, means being humble and having a modest opinion of one's own importance. This is a desirable trait. Who wants to be considered arrogant or conceited? I'd guess not too many of us. If you look up humility in the dictionary, as I had to, it will say the opposite of humility is pride. Having humility will keep pride in check.

Actually taking Step Seven was a quick and fairly easy process. As soon as I was sure that I was as entirely ready as I could possibly be to let go of my character defects, I prayed that God remove my shortcomings. At this point in my recovery, I received pretty significant and profound spiritual insight. I felt like a different person, a better person. Many personal defects that I'd never even considered as being defects became glaringly obvious. In the past, I would have called in sick to work when I was not and thought nothing of it. I would have lied to get out of doing something I didn't want to do or to get out of going somewhere I didn't want to go. I had extremely low selfestem and yet somehow still thought I was the center of the universe and was the only one who mattered. The word selfish barely describes the monster I was. Now I've come to the realization that I'm not any more important - or any less important - than anyone else. There may be things I don't want to do, but I won't lie to get out of doing them. I like this new person I've become. I like not being a liar and not being lazy or selfish. I owe the person I am today to the fellowship of AA and to my higher Power and I am grateful every day for my new life.

Tradition Seven: Every AA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

Whenever I go out to dinner in a restaurant with my husband or friends, I find myself drawn to the drinks section of the menu. I also find myself paying a lot of attention to the advertisements in the window of my local liquor store. Thanks to Alcoholics Anonymous and the hope and strength I found in its rooms, I have not had to take a drink since April 1988, and I am convinced that if I keep on following the suggestions, I will continue not to drink, one day at a time. So why my fascination with the price of alcohol? It has to do with the worth of my gratitude.

When I came into this fabulous Fellowship, I was lucky enough to get sober in a place where almost every time the Seventh Tradition basket was passed, someone explained about taking part in meeting the expenses of the group and helping to carry the message to other alcoholics whenever possible.

Early on, what I could do didn't amount to very much. I was single, barely able to meet my personal living expenses, and had a lot of financial amends to make. Even so, a small glimmer of awareness in my slowly clearing brain realized that, because AA helped me not to pick up that first drink, I was saving myself a lot of money on a daily basis. I didn't begrudge that dollar in the basket.

Several years later, I was doing better financially, not going to as many meetings every week, had gotten very involved in general service, and had watched area committees struggle to do service with the small amounts of money that most groups were able to send. It dawned on me then that there was nothing particularly sacred about "a buck in the basket." After consultation with other, wiser, women in the Fellowship, I decided to at least put in the price of a cup of coffee for myself and the newcomer with only some lint in his or her pocket.

Now I have trudged a few more years down that "Road of Happy Destiny" and connected a few more dots. I couldn't count the number of times that I have said in meetings, "I am grateful to AA and my Higher Power for not having to pick up that first drink today."

Connect. . . connect. . . connect. Why not put the price of that first drink that I didn't have to take today into the basket? It makes perfect sense to this alcoholic, since I know that not taking that first drink today has saved me not only the price of dozens more that I would have to chase it with, but saved my life, my self-respect, and a long list of other priceless personal assets that I owe to my sobriety.

So, now you know why I pay so much attention today to the drink list on the menu. Today, it's just another spiritual tool.
